PERFORMANCE REVIEW

During the year under review, on standalone basis, revenue of the company was Rs. 14260.43 Lakhs as compared to Rs.16607.85 Lakhs in the corresponding previous year. The Company earned a profit after tax of Rs. 843.15 Lakhs as compared to Rs. 754.72 Lakhs in the previous year.

On consolidated basis, revenue of the company was Rs.14295.71 Lakhs as compared to Rs. 16689.95 Lakhs in the corresponding previous year. The Company earned a profit after tax of Rs. 820.69 Lakhs as compared to Rs. 755.69 Lakhs in the previous year.

During the last quarter of the year under review, the incidence of Covid-19 developed into a global pandemic. The Directors have assessed the impact of Covid-19 on the business at the balance sheet date and there was significant adverse impact on operating revenue. The Company continues to provide the services to its customers, although some parts of the business have been disrupted due to the lockdown conditions in most part of the country. Due to the worldwide uncertainty caused by Covid-19,



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and its potential to impact the Company, the Company has put in place mitigation plans to minimize the adverse impact on both revenue and profitability.

CHANGES IN NATURE OF BUSINESS

The Company is engaged in the business of manufacturing & trading in Pharmaceuticals & allied products and there was no change in the nature of the business of the Company during the year under review.

DIVIDEND

In order to conserve the resources, the Board of Directors does not recommend any dividend for the financial year 2019-20.

RESERVES

During the financial year under review, your Company has not transferred any amount to the general reserve.

In view of the profits and turnover of the Company, your Company was required to undertake CSR projects during the year 2019-20 under the provisions of section 135 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the rules made thereunder. The Company has one subsidiary company '**Kwalita Pharmaceuticals Africa, Limitada**' at Maputo Province, Mozambique which is mainly engaged in the Pharmaceuticals business. The Board reviewed the affairs of the Company's subsidiary during the year at regular intervals. In accordance with section 129(3) of the Companies Act, 2013, the Company has prepared Consolidated Financial Statements of the Company and its subsidiary, which forms part of this Annual Report. Further a statement containing Salient features of the Financial Statements of its subsidiary in Form AOC-1 as given in the annual report forms part of the Financial Statements.

Pursuant to the section 134 (p) of Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 8 (4) of Companies Accounts Rules, 2014 and SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, the Board has carried out an annual performance evaluation of its own performance, the Directors individually, as well as the Board Committees. The performance of the Board was evaluated by the Board after seeking inputs from all the directors on the basis of the criteria such as the Board composition and structure, effectiveness of board processes, information and functioning, etc.

**ANNEXURE 'F'****MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS****INDUSTRY STRUCTURE & DEVELOPMENT**

Indian Pharma Industry has established themselves as leaders of the global pharmaceutical landscape while meeting domestic demands. Reportedly, India holds a fifth of all global manufacturing sites catering to US market. It is the only country with largest number of Pharma plants that are US-FDA compliant. Home to nearly 1400 WHO-GMP (Good Manufacturing Practices) approved Pharma Plants, with 253 European Directorate of Quality Medicines (EDQM) approved plants, it is the third largest in the world by volume. The Indian pharma industry, however, is still valued as the 14th largest with its exports contributing to only 3.5 of the total pharmaceutical exports globally.

Indian pharma industry did well in formulations and indigenous medicines sector but with the gradual liberalisation, the pharma market was flooded with imports from China. The country is heavily import dependent to fulfil its drug requirements. Around 70% of the pharmaceutical requirements are met by Chinese imports of some basic raw materials, particularly the APIs (Active Pharmaceutical Ingredients) – the bulk components to produce finished drug formulations. The highly subsidised pricing of Chinese APIs led to shutting down of domestic API manufacturing facilities in India. Indian firms gradually disengaged with the production of APIs as the capital investments on them did not yield higher returns.

OPPORTUNITIES, RISKS, CONCERNS & THREATS

The drug prices in India are considered the cheapest in the world. But the strict price control policies of the government neither allows the manufacturers to invest in R&D of new drug formulations, nor does it ensure universal accessibility. Unvetted manufacturing plants across the country, dependence on cheap imports, have increased the local capacity for drug formulations. However, this overproduction sometimes does not meet global standards, making it difficult for exporters procuring from third party manufacturers to explore newer markets.

The Company faces stiff competition from other pharmaceutical companies in India and across the world which can impact its market position and revenue. However, the Company is committed to improving the lives of people facilitated by its robust R&D, strong manufacturing facility and operational efficiencies.

The pharmaceutical industry undertakes several risky ventures that are a growing concern for pharmaceutical companies. Due to technological advancements, pharma companies take risks to have a competitive edge. Some of the risk exposure can affect the advancement of pharma companies. Patient advocacy groups are creating challenges for pharma companies.

Tax reform, U.S. pricing legislation and the repeal and replacement of the Affordable Care Act is posing a risk for M&A activity. Although, opportunistic deals will be evident in the future, pharma companies that have significant amounts of overseas cash will not take risk to overpay on taxes to engage in M&A acquisitions. Between the year 2017 and 2021, it is anticipated that US\$ 147 Billion of pharmaceutical sales are at risk due to expiring patents. This risk might potentially put a brake on the pharmaceutical industry's upward trajectory and could indicate a second patent cliff for pharma companies.

OUTLOOK

India's "Look East" policy aims at reducing trade dependencies on the US and the EU. In consonance with that policy, it is important for the government to work towards revamping the structure of the pharma industry. The government launched targeted financial incentives to promote manufacturing of raw materials, and to bring back a larger production of APIs to India. The Union Cabinet took a decisive step to establish three API parks with common utilities, identifying and reducing the dependencies on China for 53 APIs, introduced the Production Linked Incentive (PLI) scheme to further reiterate India's aim to be self-reliant.

Financial Year 2019-20 has been a challenging year with weakening macro-economic conditions, slowing market growths and finally, COVID-19 outbreak towards the end of the year. The COVID-19 pandemic has greatly affected the economic scenario in the country and around the world. The Company's products - Bulk Drugs / Medicines were declared as "Essential Commodities" by the Govt. of India and



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consequently, the factory was permitted to operate throughout the lockdown period. Despite this, due to migration of labour, lack of raw materials, non-availability of goods transport, problems in movement of staff and labour, the operations of the Company were impacted. Thus, the ongoing pandemic is likely to have some impact on the business of the Company during the current year; but it is difficult to quantify or estimate the same presently. The company has invested significant resources over the past few years in building this business and now focusing on commercial execution to ensure that future cash flows justify these significant investments. Generics will continue to be an important part of the overall healthcare management globally. Key focus areas for the company will be employees protection & keeping workplace COVID-19 free, supply chain protection, ensuring optimum utilization of our factories and working closely with vendors to ensure continuity of supply, focus on cash collection and cash conservation in the business to ensure adequate liquidity, focus on cost optimisation and continue to invest in developing new technologies and innovative products.

INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEM AND ADEQUACY

The Company has an adequate internal control system commensurate with its size and the nature of its business in order to achieve efficiency in operation and optimum utilization of resources. These controls ensure safeguarding of assets, reduction and detection of fraud and error, adequacy and completeness of the accounting records and timely preparation of reliable financial information. Internal audits are conducted in the Company on regular basis. Reports of the internal auditor are reviewed by the senior management and are also placed before the Audit Committee of the Directors. The statutory auditors also review their findings with the senior management and the Audit Committee.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of **Kwaliti Pharmaceuticals Limited** ("the Company"), which comprise the Standalone Balance Sheet as at **31st March, 2020**, the Standalone Statement of Profit and Loss and the Standalone Cash Flow Statement (collectively referred as "Standalone Financial Statements") for the year then ended, and a summary of the significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

**Description of Key Audit Matter****Existence and condition of Inventory of Raw Material, Packing and Finished Goods as at Balance Sheet Date.**

The inventory of the company is located at its factories at Nagkalan Amritsar, Raja Ka Bagh Himachal Pradesh and its supplying locations at the Lucknow Uttar Pradesh and Ahmedabad, Gujarat. The company management undertakes physical verification of these inventories during the year at the reasonable intervals. The year end physical verification as per standard procedure was however not effected due to covid-19 related lockdowns and restrictions, whereby the company management carried out and completed subsequent to year end required physical verification and carried out other procedures to validate the existence and condition of the inventory at the Balance Sheet date.

Due to Covid related movement restrictions we too were unable to attend subsequent to year end physical verification and counting of inventory, but however we took support of virtual media to participate in verification and undertook other audit procedures to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the existence and condition of inventories at the balance sheet date and identified it as a key Audit matter.

How the matter was addressed in our Audit

Covid-19 related lockdowns and physical movement restrictions impaired the procedures related to physical verification of inventories as at balance sheet date. As per the Standard on Auditing SA 501 "Audit Evidence – Specific Considerations for selected Items" if attendance at the physical counting is impracticable, the auditor shall perform alternative audit procedures to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the existence and condition of the inventory. Taking guidance from the SA 501, we participated and observed the physical verification and counting of inventories by the management through virtual media at various locations to verify the set procedure adopted for inventory verification. Also as an alternate procedure to arrive at the quantities at the balance sheet date, we carried out roll back procedures on sample basis by verifying post balance sheet records related to sales, stock transfers, production, purchases etc having impact on movement of inventory.

Information other than the financial statements and auditors' report thereon

The Company's board of directors is responsible for the preparation of the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Management Discussion and Analysis, Board's Report including Annexures to Board's Report, Corporate Governance and Shareholder's Information, but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the standalone financial statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

In terms of the information and explanations sought by us and given by the company and the books and records examined by us in the normal course of audit and to the best of our knowledge and belief, we state that: –

(i) (a) The company has maintained proper records showing full particulars including quantitative details and situation of fixed assets.

(b) As explained to us, all the assets have not been physically verified by the management during the year but there is a regular programme of verification which, in our opinion, is reasonable having regard to the size of the company and the nature of its assets. No material discrepancies were noticed on such verification.

(c) According to the information and explanations given to us and on the basis of our examination of the records of the Company, the title deeds of the Company’s Registered Office and Manufacturing unit is situated at Village Nag kalan, Majitha Road, Amritsar, Punjab, is on leased premises. The same premises is owned by Mr. Ramesh Arora and Mr. Ajay Arora, Promoters of the Company and the lease is for initial period of 49 years. Similarly, another manufacturing unit is situated at Plot No. 1-A, industrial Area Raja Ka Bagh, Tehsil Nurpur, District Kangra, Jassur, Himachal Pradesh is on also on leased premises. The same premises is owned by Government of Himachal Pradesh and the lease is for long term.

(ii) (a) As explained to us, the inventory has been physically verified at reasonable intervals during the year by the management. In our opinion, the frequency of verification is reasonable.

(b) In our opinion and on the basis of our examination of the records, the company is generally maintaining proper records of its inventories. No material discrepancy was noticed on physical verification of stocks by the management as compared to book records.

(iii) As explained to us, the company has granted loan to its subsidiary listed in register maintained under section 189 of The Companies Act, 2013 (Act). The subsidiary Company named Kquality Pharmaceuticals Africa Limitada incorporated on 20.09.2013 under the laws of Africa having identification number as 100428873. The registered office of the Company is located at Mozambique, Maputo Cidade, Distrito Urbano 1, Bairro de Central, Africa.

- a) The subsidiary is incorporated with the intention of import export and marketing of pharmaceutical products of the company. The terms of the aforementioned loan are not prejudicial to the interest of the company.
- b) The terms of the loan do not prescribe any schedule of repayment of principal and payment of interest.
- c) As stated above the terms do not provide for schedule of repayment and thus comments on status of over dues can’t be made.

(iv) The company has not given any loans, investments, guarantees, and security according to the provisions of the section 185 and 186 of the Companies Act, 2013 during the year.

(v) The Company has not accepted any deposits from the public as per the provisions of section 73 to 76 of the Companies Act 2013.



(vi) The maintenance of cost records has been specified by the central government under sub section (1) of section 148 of the Companies Act, 2013 and such accounts and records have been so made and maintained by the company.

(vii) According to the information and explanations given to us and on the basis of our examination of the records of the Company,

(a) The company is regular in depositing with appropriate authorities undisputed statutory dues including provident fund, employees' state insurance, income tax, sales tax, wealth tax, service tax, custom duty, excise duty, Goods & Service Tax, Cess and other material statutory dues applicable to it. However, in few cases company has deposited TDS and GST after due dates and paid interest on late payments.

(b) The details of dues of Income Tax that have not been deposited on account of dispute is as under:

ACIT Circle IV – Amritsar vide an order U/s 143(3) of the Income Tax Act 1961 dated 28-09-2016 made certain additions and computed the total income of the Assessee company at Rs 4,04,00,070/- against the total income declared by the company at Rs 88,99,070/- for the Assessment year 2012-2013. The assessee company went in appeal against this order of the assessing officer with CIT (Appeals) Amritsar. CIT (Appeals) vide its order u/s 250(6) dated 26/10/2016 partly deleted additions amounting to Rs 2,00,00,000/- and confirmed the part additions amounting to Rs 1,15,01,000/-. The assessee Company has filed further appeal to Income Tax Appellate Tribunal on 25/11/2016 vide ITA 587/Asr/2016 for deleting the additions confirmed by the CIT (Appeals). Similarly the Income Tax Department has also filed a parallel appeal against CIT (Appeals) order deleting the additions of Rs 2,00,00,000/- on 05/12/2016 vide ITA 623/Asr/2016. The order of the ITAT is pending till date. And as per the information received the final hearings for both the appeals are on 25.08.2020.

The total additional tax demand of Rs 1,33,53,680/- created vide order of assessing officer stands reduced proportionately by deletion of additions amounting to Rs 2,00,00,000/- against total additions of Rs 3,15,01,000/-. The assessee company though filed appeal against that CIT (Appeals) order, as stated above, but however has already deposited in protest demand proportionately to the total assessment made.

(viii) Based on our audit procedures and according to the information and explanations given to us, we are of the opinion, the company has not defaulted in repayment of dues to a financial institution, bank, Government or dues to debenture holders.

(ix) In our opinion and according to the information and explanations given to us, the money raised by way of term loans were applied for the purposes for which those were raised. The company has not raised money by way of Initial Public Offer/Further Public Offer during the year.

(x) Based upon the audit procedures performed and according to the information and explanations given to us, no fraud by the company or any fraud on the company by its officers or employees has been noticed or reported during the course of our audit, that causes the financial statements to be materially misstated.

(xi) According to the information and explanations given to us, managerial remuneration has been paid or provided in accordance with the requisite approvals mandated by the provision of Section 197 read with schedule 5 to the Companies Act, 2013.

(xii) The company is not a Nidhi Company hence this clause is not applicable.

* ACIT Circle IV – Amritsar vide an order U/s 143(3) of the Income Tax Act 1961 dated 28-09-2016 made certain additions and computed the total income of the Assessee company at Rs 4,04,00,070/- against the total income declared by the company at Rs 88,99,070/- for the Assessment year 2012-2013. The assessee company went in appeal against this order of the assessing officer with CIT (Appeals) Amritsar. CIT (Appeals) vide its order u/s 250(6) dated 26/10/2016 partly deleted additions amounting to Rs 2,00,00,000/- and confirmed the part



additions amounting to Rs 1,15,01,000/-. The assessee Company has filed further appeal to Income Tax Appellate Tribunal on 25/11/2016 vide ITA 587/Asr/2016 for deleting the additions confirmed by the CIT(Appeals). Similarly the Income Tax Department has also filed a parallel appeal against CIT (Appeals) order deleting the additions of Rs 2,00,00,000/- on 05/12/2016 vide ITA 623/Asr/2016. The order of the ITAT is pending till date and as per the information received the final hearings for both the appeals are on 25.08.2020.

The total additional tax demand of Rs 1,33,53,680/- created vide order of assessing officer stands reduced proportionately by deletion of additions amounting to Rs 2,00,00,000/- against total additions of Rs 3,15,01,000/-. The assessee company though filed appeal against that CIT (Appeals) order, as stated above, but however has already deposited in protest demand proportionately to the total assessment made.

❖ **Pending Litigations**

The Company has certain pending litigations against it with respect to marketing and quality of its products. The litigations are pending in various forums. As per management representation, the financial impact of these litigations cannot be ascertained.

41. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Corporate Information

The company was incorporated as private limited company on 04/05/1983 under the Companies Act, 1956, in the state of Punjab at Amritsar. The company was then converted into public limited company on 28/12/2015, subsequently name changed to Kwalita Pharmaceuticals Limited. Thereafter, the company obtained listing status on the SME platform of Bombay Stock Exchange by making the Initial Public Offer and the shares of the company were listed on the SME platform of BSE on 18th of July, 2016. The company is engaged in the business of manufacturers, buyers and sellers of and dealers in all kinds of drugs intermediates, chemicals, extracts, alkaloids and other pharmaceutical goods, toilet requisites, medicines, beverages and other medical preparations.

i) Basis of preparation of Financial Statements:

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles in India (Indian GAAP) to comply with the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the 2013 Act") as applicable. The financial statements have been prepared on accrual basis under the historical cost convention. The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees in Lakhs and rounded off upto two decimal places.

ii) Use of Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions to



be made that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities on the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates. The difference between the actual results and estimates are recognized in the period in which the results are known / materialized.

iii) Current and Non-Current Classification:

All the Assets and Liabilities have been classified as current and non-current based on the normal operating cycle of the Company and other criteria laid down in Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of products / activities of the Company and the normal time between acquisition of assets and their realisation in cash or cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as twelve months for the purpose of current and non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

iv) Fixed Assets and Depreciation:

Fixed assets are carried at cost of acquisition or construction, less accumulated depreciation and adjusted for revaluation/impairment loss, if any. The cost of fixed assets comprises its purchase price net of any trade discounts and rebates, any import duties and other taxes (other than those subsequently recoverable from the tax authorities), any directly attributable expenditure on making the asset ready for its intended use, other incidental expenses and interest on borrowings attributable to acquisition of qualifying fixed assets up to the date the asset is ready for its intended use.

Depreciation on fixed assets is calculated on written down value basis using the rates arrived at based on the useful life of the assets prescribed under Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 for the year ended on March 31, 2020.

v) Leases:

The Company's Registered Office and Manufacturing unit is situated at Village Nagkalan, Majitha Road, Amritsar, Punjab, is on leased premises. The same premises is owned by Mr. Ramesh Arora & Mr. Ajay Arora, Promoters of the Company and the lease is for initial period of 49 years. Similarly, another manufacturing unit is situated at Plot No. 1-A, industrial Area Raja KaBagh, Tehsil Nurpur, District Kangra, Jassur, Himachal Pradesh is on also on leased premises. The same premise is owned by Government of Himachal Pradesh and the lease is for long term. Lease Rentals are for the assets taken on lease paid to the lessors are recognized as expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

vi) Revenue Recognition:

Revenue from sale of goods is recognised when the significant risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred to the buyer, recovery of the consideration is probable, the associated cost can be estimated reliably, there is no continuing effective control or managerial involvement with the goods, and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably.



Revenue from operations is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government.

vii) Inventories:

Inventories of finished goods are valued at lower of the cost or net realizable value (NRV). Raw Materials and other supplies held for use in the production of inventories are not written down below cost if the finished products in which they will be incorporated are expected to be sold at or above cost.

However, when there has been a decline in the price of materials and it is estimated that the cost of the finished products will exceed net realisable value, the materials are written down to net realisable value. In such circumstances, the replacement cost of the materials may be the best available measure of their net realisable value.

viii) Impairment of Assets:

An asset is treated as impaired when the carrying cost of assets exceeds its recoverable value. An impairment loss is charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss in the year in which an asset is identified as impaired. The impairment loss recognized in prior accounting period is reversed if there has been a change in the estimate of recoverable amount. However, no such instance is present in the financial statements for the year ended 31 March, 2020.

ix) Research and Development Cost:

Presently, company's R&D Centre situated at Amritsar for the identification and development of potential products. The Company intends to continue its initiatives in research and development in order to enhance its differentiated product portfolio in both the Domestic Market and international markets. Expenditure incurred on research and development is neither recognised nor treated separately in the books of accounts.

x) Investments:

Investments that are readily realizable and intended to be held for not more than a year are classified as current investments. All other investments are classified as long term investments. Current Investments are carried at the lower of cost or quoted / fair value computed scrip wise, Long Term Investments are stated at cost. Provision for diminution in the value of long term investments is made only if such decline is other than temporary.

xi) Foreign Currency Transactions and Translation:

Foreign Currency Transactions are recorded at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of the transaction. Monetary items denominated in foreign currencies at the year-end are



adjusted at the year-end exchange rates. Any gain or loss arising on account of exchange difference either on settlement or on translation is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss except in case of Long Term Liabilities and assets. Non-monetary items are carried at historical cost.

xii) Government Grants and Subsidies:

Government grants are accounted when there is reasonable assurance that the Company will comply with the conditions attached to them and it is reasonably certain that the ultimate collection will be made. Capital subsidy in nature of Government Grants related to specific fixed assets is accounted for where collection is reasonably certain and the same is shown as a deduction from the gross value of the asset concerned in arriving at its book value and accordingly the depreciation is provided on the reduced book value.

xiii) Provision for Current Tax and Deferred Tax:

Tax expenses comprises of Current tax and Deferred tax. Current Tax provision, if any, has been made on the basis of reliefs and deductions available under the Income Tax Act, 1961. Deferred tax resulting from “timing differences” between taxable and accounting income that originate in one period and are capable of being reversed in one or more subsequent period is accounted for using the tax rates and laws that are enacted or substantively enacted as on the Balance Sheet date. The deferred tax asset is recognised and carried forward only to the extent that there is a reasonable certainty that the assets can be realised in future. However, where there is unabsorbed capital expenditure or carry forward losses under taxation laws, deferred tax assets are recognized only if there is virtual certainty of realisation of such assets. Deferred tax assets are reviewed as at each Balance Sheet date.

xiv) Employee Benefits:

Short-term employee benefits are recognized as an expense at the undiscounted amount in the Statement of Profit and Loss of the year in which the related service is rendered. Post employment and other long term employee benefits are recognized by creating provisions against the expected payout and by contributions to the retirement funds such as provident fund contribution.

xv) Contingent Liabilities / Provisions:

Contingent liabilities are not provided in the accounts and are disclosed separately in notes on accounts. Provision is made in the accounts in respect of contingent liabilities which is likely to materialize into liabilities after the year end, till the finalization of accounts and which have material effect on the position stated in the Balance Sheet.

**xvi) Revaluation of Assets:**

The company assesses at each balance sheet date whether there is any indication due to external factors that an asset or group of assets comprising a cash generating unit (CGU) may be revalued. If any such indication exists, then the revaluation of the value of assets is done by certified valuer. If such recoverable amount of the asset or the recoverable amount of the CGU, to which the asset belongs is more than the carrying amount of the asset or the CGU as the case may be, the carrying amount is increased to its recoverable amount and the addition is treated as addition in the value of asset and is recognized in the Revaluation reserve under Reserves and Surplus. If at any subsequent balance sheet date, there is an indication that a previously assessed revaluation no longer exists, the recoverable amount is re assessed and the asset is reflected at recoverable amount subject to a maximum of depreciated historical cost and is accordingly reversed in the statement of profit and loss.

xvii) Earnings Per Share:

Basic earnings per share is computed by dividing the net profit for the year after prior period adjustments attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year. For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, profit after tax for the year and weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of **KWALITY PHARMACEUTICALS LIMITED** (hereinafter referred to as "the Holding Company") and its foreign subsidiary (the Holding Company and its foreign subsidiary together referred to as "the Group") comprising of the Consolidated Balance Sheet as at **31st March, 2020**, the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss and the Consolidated Cash Flow Statement for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "the consolidated financial statements").

In our opinion and best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid consolidated financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the consolidated state of affairs of the Group as at **31st March 2020**, the consolidated profit and its consolidated cash flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Companies Act, 2013. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditors Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Rules there under, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.



Description of Key Audit Matter

Existence and condition of Inventory of Raw Material, Packing and Finished Goods as at Balance Sheet Date.

The inventory of the company is located at its factories at Nagkalan Amritsar, Raja Ka Bagh Himachal Pradesh and its supplying locations at the Lucknow Uttar Pradesh and Ahmedabad, Gujarat. The company management undertakes physical verification of these inventories during the year at the reasonable intervals. The year end physical verification as per standard procedure was however got effected due to covid-19 related lockdowns and restrictions, whereby the company management carried out and completed subsequent to year end required physical verification and carried out other procedures to validate the existence and condition of the inventory at the Balance Sheet date.

Due to Covid related movement restrictions we too were unable to attend subsequent to year end physical verification and counting of inventory, but however we took support of virtual media to participate in verification and undertook other audit procedures to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the existence and condition of inventories at the balance sheet date and indentified it as a key Audit matter.

How the matter was addressed in our Audit

Covid-19 related lockdowns and physical movement restrictions impaired the procedures related to physical verification of inventories as at balance sheet date. As per the Standard on Auditing SA 501 "Audit Evidence – Specific Considerations for selected Items" if attendance at the physical counting is impracticable, the auditor shall perform alternative audit procedures to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the existence and condition of the inventory. Taking guidance from the SA 501, we participated and observed the physical verification and counting of inventories by the management through virtual media at various locations to verify the set procedure adopted for inventory verification. Also as an alternate procedure to arrive at the quantities at the balance sheet date, we carried out roll back procedures on sample basis by verifying post balance sheet records related to sales, stock transfers, production, purchases etc having impact on movement of inventory.

Information other than the financial statements and auditors' report thereon

The Company's board of directors is responsible for the preparation of the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Management Discussion and Analysis, Board's Report including Annexures to Board's Report, Corporate Governance and Shareholder's Information, but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the Consolidated financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the Consolidated financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the Consolidated financial statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Management's Responsibility for the Consolidated Financial Statements



The Holding Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the preparation of these Consolidated financial statements in terms of the requirement of the Companies Act, 2013 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act") that give a true and fair view of the consolidated financial position, consolidated financial performance and consolidated cash flows of the Group in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act, read with rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014. The respective Board of Directors of the companies included in the Group are responsible for maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the Group and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; the selection and application of the appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, which have been used for the purpose of preparation of the consolidated financial statements by the Directors of the Holding Company, as aforesaid.

4. Significant Accounting Policies**i) a) Basis of accounting and preparation of financial statements**

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles in India (Indian GAAP) to comply with the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rule, 2014 and the relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the 2013 Act"). The financial statements have been prepared on accrual basis under the historical cost convention.

b) Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Indian GAAP requires the Management to make estimates and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) and the reported income and expenses during the year. The Management believes that the estimates used in preparation of the consolidated financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Future results could differ due to these estimates and the differences between the, actual results and the estimates are recognized in the periods in which the results are known / materialize.

**II) Principles of Consolidation:**

The consolidated financial statements pertain to Kwaliti Pharmaceuticals Limited (“the Company”/ “the Parent”/ “the Holding Company”) and its subsidiary company. The financial statements of the subsidiary are drawn upto the same reporting date as that of the Holding Company, i.e. year ended 31st March, 2020.

These consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the following basis:

- a) The financial statements of the Company and its subsidiary company are combined on a line-by-line basis by adding together, the book value of like items of assets, liabilities, income and expenses, after fully eliminating intra-group balances and intra-group transactions resulting in unrealised profits or losses unless cost cannot be recovered in accordance with Accounting Standard-21 -“Consolidated Financial Statements”.
- b) As far as possible, the Consolidated Financial Statements are prepared using uniform accounting policies for like transactions and other events in similar circumstances and are presented in the same manner as the Company’s separate Financial Statements.
- c) In case of foreign subsidiaries, being integral operations, revenue items are consolidated at the average rate prevailing during the year. All assets and liabilities are converted at the rates prevailing at the end of the year except for the fixed assets which are consolidated at the historical rate. Any exchange difference arising on consolidation is recognized in Consolidated Statement of Profit & Loss.
- d) Minority Interest in the net assets of consolidated subsidiaries is identified and presented in the Consolidated Balance Sheet separately from liabilities and equity of the Company's shareholders. Minority interest in the net assets of consolidated subsidiaries consists of:
 - i. The amount of equity attributable to minority at the date on which investment in a subsidiary is made; and
 - ii. The minority share of movements in equity since the date the parent subsidiary relationship came into existence.
- e) Minority Interest’s share of net loss of consolidated subsidiaries for the year is identified and adjusted against the profit after tax of the Group.

The Company does not expect the outcome of the matters stated above to have material adverse impact on the Company's financial condition, results of operation or cash flows.

* ACIT Circle IV – Amritsar vide an order U/s 143(3) of the Income Tax Act 1961 dated 28-09-2016 made certain additions and computed the total income of the Assessee company at Rs 4,04,00,070/- against the total income declared by the company at Rs 88,99,070/- for the Assessment year 2012-2013. The assessee company went in appeal against this order of the assessing officer with CIT (Appeals) Amritsar. CIT(Appeals) vide its order u/s 250(6) dated 26/10/2016 partly deleted additions amounting to Rs 2,00,00,000/- and confirmed the part additions amounting to Rs 1,15,01,000/-. The assessee Company has filed further appeal to Income Tax Appellate Tribunal on 25/11/2016 vide ITA 587/Asr/2016 for deleting the additions confirmed by the CIT(Appeals). Similarly the Income Tax Department has also filed a parallel appeal against CIT (Appeals) order deleting the additions of Rs 2,00,00,000/- on 05/12/2016 vide ITA 623/Asr/2016. The order of the ITAT is pending till date and as per the information received the final hearings for both the appeals are on 25.08.2020.

The total additional tax demand of Rs 1,33,53,680/- created vide order of assessing officer stands reduced proportionately by deletion of additions amounting to Rs 2,00,00,000/- against total additions of Rs 3,15,01,000/-. The assessee company though filed appeal against that CIT (Appeals) order, as stated above, but however has already deposited in protest demand proportionately to the total assessment made.

❖ Pending Litigations

The Company has certain pending litigations against it with respect to marketing and quality of its products. The litigations are pending in various forums. As per management representation, the financial impact of these litigations cannot be ascertained.



V) Other Accounting Policies

a) Fixed Assets (Tangible/ Intangible)

Fixed assets are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation / amortisation and impairment losses, if any. The cost of fixed assets comprises its purchase price net of any trade discounts and rebates, any import duties and other taxes (other than those subsequently recoverable from the tax authorities), any directly attributable expenditure on making the asset ready for its intended use, other incidental expenses and interest on borrowings attributable to acquisition of qualifying fixed assets up to the date the asset is ready for its intended use.

b) Impairment of Assets

For the purpose of impairment testing, goodwill is allocated to each of the Group's cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination.

Cash-generating units to which goodwill has been allocated are tested for impairment annually, or more frequently when there is an indication that the unit's value may be impaired. If the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit is less than the carrying amount of the unit, the impairment loss is allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill allocated to the unit and then to the other assets of the unit in proportion to the carrying amount of each asset in the unit. An impairment loss recognized for goodwill is not reversed in a subsequent period. Fixed assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that their carrying amount may not be recoverable.

An impairment loss is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss if the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount.

c) Depreciation and amortisation

In respect of Indian parent Company:

Fixed assets are carried at cost of acquisition or construction, less accumulated depreciation and adjusted for revaluation/impairment loss, if any. The cost of fixed assets comprises its purchase price net of any trade discounts and rebates, any import duties and other taxes (other than those subsequently recoverable from the tax authorities), any directly attributable expenditure on making the asset ready for its intended use, other incidental expenses and interest on borrowings attributable to acquisition of qualifying fixed assets up to the date the asset is ready for its intended use.

Depreciation on fixed assets is calculated on written down value basis using the rates arrived at based on the useful life of the assets prescribed under Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 for the year ended on March 31, 2020.

d) Borrowing Cost

Borrowing costs include interest, amortisation of ancillary costs incurred and exchange differences arising from foreign currency borrowings to the extent they are regarded as an adjustment to the interest cost. Costs in connection with the borrowing of funds to the extent not directly related to the acquisition of qualifying assets are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss over the tenure of the loan. Borrowing costs, allocated to and utilised for qualifying assets, pertaining to the period from commencement of activities relating to construction / development of the qualifying asset upto the date of capitalisation of such asset are added to the cost of the assets. Capitalisation of borrowing costs is suspended and charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss during extended periods when active development activity on the qualifying assets is interrupted.

e) Investments



Long term investments are stated at cost. Provision for diminution in the value of long term investments is made only if such a decline is other than temporary in nature. Current Investments are stated at lower of cost or fair value.

f) Inventories

Inventories of finished goods are valued at lower of the cost or net realizable value (NRV). Raw Materials and other supplies held for use in the production of inventories are not written down below cost if the finished products in which they will be incorporated are expected to be sold at or above cost.

However, when there has been a decline in the price of materials and it is estimated that the cost of the finished products will exceed net realisable value, the materials are written down to net realisable value. In such circumstances, the replacement cost of the materials may be the best available measure of their net realisable value.

g) Revenue Recognition

Revenue from sale of goods is recognised when the significant risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred to the buyer, recovery of the consideration is probable, the associated cost can be estimated reliably, there is no continuing effective control or managerial involvement with the goods, and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably.

Revenue from operations is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding taxes or duties collected on behalf of the government.

h) Foreign Currency Transactions/ Translation

a) Transactions in foreign currencies entered into by the Company are accounted at the exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction. Foreign currency monetary items of the Company, outstanding at the balance sheet date are restated at the year-end rates. Non-monetary items of the Company are carried at historical cost.

b) Exchange differences arising on settlement / restatement of short-term foreign currency monetary assets and liabilities of the Company are recognised as income or expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

i) Employee Benefits

Short-term employee benefits are recognized as an expense at the undiscounted amount in the Statement of Profit and Loss of the year in which the related service is rendered. Post employment and other long term employee benefits are recognized by creating provisions against the expected payout and by contributions to the retirement funds such as provident fund contribution.

j) Accounting for Tax

Tax expenses comprises of Current tax and Deferred tax. Current Tax provision, if any, has been made on the basis of reliefs and deductions available under the Income Tax Act, 1961. Deferred tax resulting from “timing differences” between taxable and accounting income that originate in one period and are capable of being reversed in one or more subsequent period is accounted for using the tax rates and laws that are enacted or substantively enacted as on the Balance Sheet date. The deferred tax asset is recognised and carried forward only to the extent that there is a reasonable certainty that the assets can be realised in future. However, where there is unabsorbed capital expenditure or carry forward losses



under taxation laws, deferred tax assets are recognized only if there is virtual certainty of realisation of such assets. Deferred tax assets are reviewed as at each Balance Sheet date.

k) Leases

The Holding Company's Registered Office and Manufacturing unit is situated at Village Nagkalan, Majitha Road, Amritsar, Punjab, is on leased premises. The same premises is owned by Mr. Ramesh Arora Mr. Ajay Arora, Promoters of the Company and the lease is for initial period of 49 years. Similarly, another manufacturing unit is situated at Plot No. 1-A, industrial Area Raja Ka Bagh, Tehsil Nurpur, District Kangra, Jassur, Himachal Pradesh is on also on leased premises. The same premises is owned by Government of Himachal Pradesh and the lease is for long term. Lease Rentals are for the assets taken on lease paid to the lessors are recognized as expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

l) Government Grants and Subsidies

Government grants are accounted when there is reasonable assurance that the Company will comply with the conditions attached to them and it is reasonably certain that the ultimate collection will be made. Capital subsidy in nature of Government Grants related to specific fixed assets is accounted for where collection is reasonably certain and the same is shown as a deduction from the gross value of the asset concerned in arriving at its book value and accordingly the depreciation is provided on the reduced book value.

m) Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

Provisions involving substantial degree of estimation in measurement are recognised when there is a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources. Contingent Liabilities are not recognized but are disclosed in the notes. Contingent Assets are neither recognised nor disclosed in the financial statements.

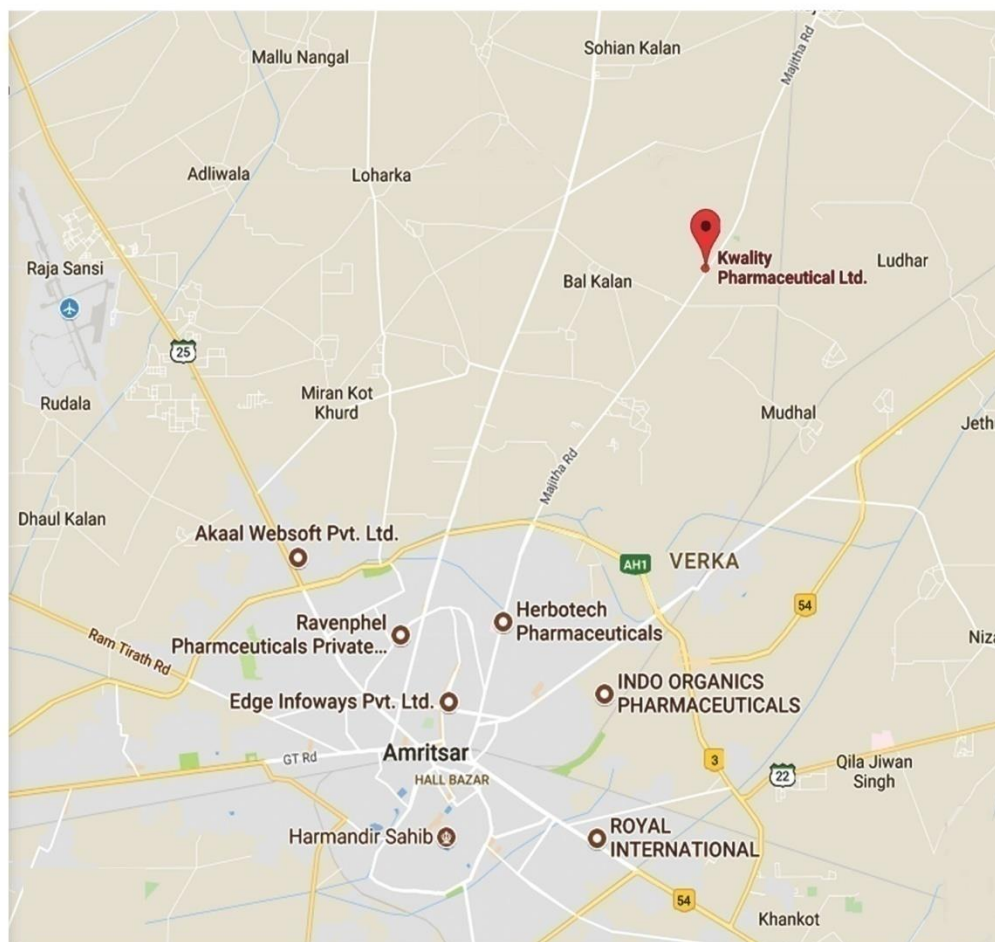
